About Multiple Modalities

I promise this is the only edu-jargon I will use. They have a saying in the restaurant business, "Presentation is everything." This adage applies to EI, too. It is about delivering content in different ways to maintain student interest and keep the lesson fresh and moving forward. Short video clips, primary source documents, music, maps, call-response, and dramatic readings, are examples.

No sources, no history. Frequent application of historical sources reinforce their primary role in studying and understanding the past, and pairs perfectly with explicit instruction.
